STANDARDS

Nine standards:

- Infrastructure protection.
- Security technology systems.
- Radio/communication contact with law enforcement.
- Communications to community.
- Crisis plans.
- Testing, exercises and training.
- Fire, tornado and crisis drills.
- Collaboration at the local level.
- Firearms safety.



2019-2020 GRANT FUNDING

2019-2020 will only allow projects associated with Standards 1 and 2.

- Building projects that can be implemented in phases.
- Include local collaborative partners.
- Projects submitted and approved will have to be completed by June 30, 2020.



SENATE BILL 128: CRISIS DRILLS

Under the direction of the fire marshal:

- Four fire drills.
- Two tornado drills (September and March) Under the direction of the Safe and Secure Unit:
- At least three crisis drills.

Manner in which such crisis drills are conducted may be subject to approval by the Safe and Secure Schools Unit.

WHAT IS SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY?

• Unusual activity doesn't always indicate that a crime is occurring. However, you know what is normal for your neighborhood and community. If behavior appears to be outside the norm, or frightens you, let law enforcement know.





Suspicious Activity May Include:

- An expressed threat to commit a crime.
- Threats of violence, or a communicated or displayed intent to cause harm to another person or persons.
- Threats against schools, facilities or events.
- Surveillance of facilities or people.



- Attempts to enter restricted areas, test security systems or tamper with a secure site.
- Signs of human trafficking indicating a person isn't free to leave.
- Signs of drug activity such as recurring, brief visits to and from a property.




SUPPORT OF SAR

- Immediate response.
- Immediate referral.
- Immediate notification to school district crisis teams for immediate intervention.

Natural Disaster Affects on School Districts



HISTORICAL DATA

Jan. 16, 1882: Iola, KS - A group of boys shot into a schoolhouse, but no one was hurt. Two were arrested, plead guilty and each paid \$9 fine.

Nov. 20, 1883: Barber Co, KS – A bunch of drunken cowboys stopped at several schoolhouses, forcing two teachers to drink whiskey and fired numerous shots at the three schoolhouses.

April 27, 1912: Manhattan, KS - During a school play rehearsal, a boy loaded his revolver, unknown to others. Pearl Reedy, an 18-year-old girl who was to use the gun in the play, said she was afraid to handle it. The teacher said she didn't need to fear it and pointed it at Reedy, squeezing the trigger. Reedy was fatally wounded.

HISTORICAL DATA

June 4, 1937: Isabel, KS - 16-year-old Robert Douthitt, was accidentally killed backstage during high school play practice. The revolver was to have been loaded with blanks, but it held live ammunition. ^(A)

Jan. 21, 1985: Goddard, KS - Armed with a rifle and a handgun, 14-year-old James Alan Kearbey, killed principal, James McGee, and wounded two teachers and a student at Goddard Junior High School.
